Snapshot of the **Great Debate**

Established in 1982, the Great Debate is the culminating event of the Young Leaders Conference experience. In creating the YLC, the National Hispanic Institute wanted to begin training a new corps of highly motivated, high achieving leaders who would have the capacities to communicate at the highest levels. Participants in the YLC Great Debate join regional teams and compete for individual and team awards in a series of intellectually challenging communications debates. Once a student completes the YLC experience they return to school for their 10th grade year much more motivated, with an enhanced competency for reasoning, argumentations, critical analysis, and public speaking. As NHI's oldest program, the YLC Great Debate prepares students to compete at the highest levels.

The Big Show — the Great Debate — is where all of the local regions from Texas gather for an annual tournament. Come ready and prepared for the most in your face, raw competitive experience of your life! Only the best and brightest students are given the opportunity to participate in the YLC. Do you have what it takes? Will you be ready? Will you win against all odds? Only time will tell.

Your preparation at home will determine your success at the Great Debate. You will take part in a round-robin tournament where you will be asked to face off four times with strangers from different parts of the state. Your opponents will be like you — hardnosed, competitive and ambitious. In the end, your score will determine your destiny.

Those who advance will compete in a single elimination tournament the next day. Win, continue! Lose, go home! Eventually there will be only the top two standing. The finals will be held in a college auditorium in front of hundreds.

In the end, you will find out several things about yourself. Your ideas will be your backbone. You will eventually understand that it is OK for you to speak your mind, and to be aggressive in convincing others. At the same time, you will understand the proper procedures to win the game. Furthermore, you will sharpen your speaking skills to a master level.

Finally get ready to meet and become friends with some of the most amazing people you will ever meet. "By learning to compete at a highest level, you start demanding more of yourself and those around you," said YLC National Director Tino Villarreal, a 1996 Tip of Texas YLCer. "That's what leadership is...learning how to positively impact those around you and making them more effective."

Local Training Sessions

The Young Leaders Conference Great Debate combines the exposure and prestige of a statewide program with the convenience and atmosphere of local training.

The YLC Great Debate begins in your local region. For three intense months you will be pushed to your limits by a team of volunteers that includes your Project Administrator, college students, and, most visibly other high school students. The majority of training is directed by other teenagers who recently attended the program. The experience is nothing like school. The atmosphere is electric.

However, the local component consists of more than just training meetings. An Induction Ceremony kicks off the program. Social events, community service projects and other events fill up the calendar. Some regions finish off training with a Regional Great Debate and the season with a recognition banquet.

The local component is aimed at expanding your perspective. As the cliché goes, you get the roots so you can expand your wings.

"You jump into your community and find your place in it," said Fernando Flor, a 2006 Rio Grande Valley YLCer and National Runner Up in Oratory. "You learn that there is more than just your little clique in high school. You become friends with individuals from across the country that are just like you."

About the National Hispanic Institute

The National Hispanic Institute was established in 1979 and is known nationally and internationally for its work in Latino youth leadership development. Through various leadership experiences tailored for specific age groups, the Institute has developed a network of programs that enhance a young person's readiness for leadership that begin in eighth grade and continue through college. A unique aspect of the Institute's approach to leadership development is the emphasis on community equity building to train future Latino leaders. Rather than relying on social advocacy and reform, NHI prefers building the capacities within the Latino community — to find new answers to challenges and to become stronger, contributing partners of the American experience.

NHI Founders

For nearly three decades, Ernesto Nieto and Gloria de León (*below*) have been the principal architects of all NHI youth leadership initiatives. The husband and wife team have been the driving force behind an organization that today is both national and international. Ernesto Nieto is originally from Houston, Texas. He is a Distinguished Alumnus of Southwestern University and was recently named to its Board of Trustees. He is author of *Third Reality: Crafting a 21st Century Latino Agenda.* Gloria de León is originally from McAllen, in the Texas Rio Grande Valley. She is a Distinguished Alumnus of the University of Texas-Pan American. Both Ernesto and Gloria have been recognized by the National Association for College Admissions Counseling and were awarded Honorary Doctorates by Texas Wesleyan Universities among their many honors. They remain highly active in all NHI training programs.





Registration Fee

Registration fee for the program is **\$425** and includes local training, food and housing at the Great Debate. This fee does not include transportation to and from the host university (will be determined locally). The \$20 application fee is part of the total tuition.

Fees charged by the National Hispanic Institute represent only a portion of the actual costs of the program. Amounts paid by students cover the national outreach and selection of applicants prior to participation in the program. NHI contributes the instructional training segments of the program along with its partners that include host institutions and volunteers. Once admitted, deposits and registration fees are not refundable should a student be unable to attend.

Upon acceptance, students receive instructions to secure sponsors beyond family contributions. Local business and individual sponsors are provided tax-deductible receipts for contributions made in behalf of students. Families may also reach contributors through the National Hispanic Institute Kintera online fundraising site. This site offers a simple website to forward messages to friends and family for contributions to attend the program.

Application Requirements

Space in the Texas Great Debate's are competitive and assigned on a first come, first serve basis. Students are encouraged to apply EARLY in order to gain additional time to find sponsors. Only complete applications are considered and must include:

- □ Completed, signed application
- School certification of grades including a recent report card or transcript
- Parental Release Signatures
- □ \$20 application fee
- □ Submitted or postmarked by the deadline

Students may apply online at **www.nhi-net.org** and submit parental release form and application fee by mail. All items must be received by the deadline in order to be considered.

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Eligibility

- ▶ High School Freshman
- ▶ 85/3.2 or above grade point average
- > Enrolled in a college bound curriculum
- Active participation in school and community activities

Confirmation Process

Once a student is accepted, space is reserved with a \$75 deposit due within 30 days. This secures a student reservation in a particular program. NHI will "hold" space in the program only until the December 15th confirmation deadline. Spaces not filled by this deadline will be opened to alternates on a "wait list".

NHI recruitment will conclude its national enrollment efforts by December 2007. It will not continue to recruit students once a program is filled. Please note that fees submitted by students and families represent a mutual agreement to attend and therefore, cannot be refunded. Financial policy and explanations are distributed to all students accepted into the program. Families are asked to conduct a complete review the policy prior to submitting any deposit or registration fees.

The December 15, 2007 registration deadline balance is \$330. Students may apply early and arrange monthly payments in advance of the deadline if necessary. Specific instructions are included in the acceptance package.
